Human Trafficking is a criminal activity in which human beings are exploited for another person's monetary gain. Human trafficking happens in communities all over the world. There is no one "face of human trafficking." As hospitality employees, we are the eyes and ears of the hotel.

RECOGNIZE THE SIGNS

TRAFFICKER

- pays for the room one day at a time
- escorts various men into the room and lingers until they leave, watching the door
- requests for isolated, private rooms, or rooms close to an exit
- does not leave victim alone
- controls all money and identification
- insists on little or no housekeeping
- openly threatens or physically assaults the victims

VICTIM

- dressed inappropriately for age or weather
- fearful of authority figures, may avoid eye contact
- does not speak freely
- drugged, disoriented, confused, lacking sleep, or showing signs of abuse
- not in possession of passports, or other travel or identity documents
- has little or no luggage
- malnourished, injuries at different stages of healing, and/or lack of medical care

WHAT YOU CAN DO TO HELP

- **BE ALERT** during large gatherings such as conventions or sporting games
- **DO NOT** confront the child or the adult
- **ALERT** the manager on duty
- **MAKE NOTE** of date and time of suspected incident, location, and identifying characteristics
